Tell us a little about the work you've done at Emory throughout your career.

I've worked with the Division of Animal Resources (previously the Office of the University Veterinarian) from the time I was an Emory College student, starting in 1977. I was a Pre-Veterinary major and an animal care technician in the Woodruff Memorial Research Building, taking care of guinea pigs, rats, mice, and rabbits. In 1981, I started on the permanent staff the day after my Emory graduation as a Clerical Specialist III and was one of two people working in the office. Everything that required documentation or accounting was done manually on columnar pads with up to 13 columns (for those that have never used them, these are large manual spreadsheets bound in a pad). Over the years, I have seen the introduction of the first word processors and electronic typewriters and then computers. We moved our records into a database which has been upgraded three times and have seen our administrative staff grow from a team of 2 to a team of 19. My role has evolved many times over the years from meeting the division's clerical needs, to cost accountant and database manager, office manager and now as a resource leader. The years have provided me time to view and participate in the growth of Emory's biomedical research, participate in activities across the University in many roles: as student, student leader, alumna, staff member and now manager/leader, parent, employee representative, and even mom to an Emory alumna.
